

**ANALYTICAL QUESTIONS for JANE EYRE by CHARLOTTE BRONTE**  
 The following short answer questions developed to allow students to practice with their analysis on a small, controlled scale. Each question attends to different literary methodologies, requires the use of critical thinking, and challenges students to use textual writing to bridge the gap between concrete and abstract ideas. As a result, these questions can be used as homework assignments, in-class writing assignments, collaborative group work. Additionally, the responses to these questions can act as a diagnostic to help identify weaknesses in students' reading comprehension, writing ability, analytical skills, and capacity for both abstract and critical thought. Each section of questions is highly differentiated and thus includes all types of learners. Moreover, each question was written with standards in mind and are in fact on skills that are imperative for success in ELA testing. These are all relatively high level questions that can be easily modified to reach students of all levels.

1. Discuss Jane's observations about the book she is reading and draw a conclusion. Cite textual evidence that support it.
2. Discuss the importance of Bessie's tales.
3. Discuss logic and emotion as they apply to the main events in Chapter 11. What do they reveal about Jane's character?
4. Interpret the image in the first paragraph of Chapter 11.
5. Comment on the color red.
6. Review all references to nature keyed in your text and interpret the imagery associated with nature.
7. Discuss the affects of Bronte's use of light and dark. Cite at least one specific example to illustrate and prove your points.
8. Discuss the metaphor in Bookiehurst's phrase: "the nursery of chosen plants" (52). In his choice of metaphor ironic? Sarcastic? Both?
9. Analyze the passage, which begins: "The handle turned" and which ends "like a carved mask" (52).
10. Comment on the season in Chapters I – VII.
11. Comment on Miss Temple's nature and character.
12. Discuss Jilia's natural curls in Chapter VII.
